Parking


Please make sure for the safety of all, that cars are parked in designated areas and when using the car line up the driveway that you proceed to yellow line before collecting children

Lent

During Lent, Christians are encouraged to focus more on talking personally to God (prayer), to give up something that they enjoy (fasting) and to help others in need (almsgiving). Lent can be seen as a journey towards Easter where we can choose to follow Jesus more closely and develop a change of heart.

The gospel this week focuses on Jesus fasting for forty days in the desert and struggling with temptation. A born leader, he was tempted to abuse his power. Many people in Israel were waiting for a *messiah* - a word we understand as *saviour* - to lead a violent revolt against Rome. However, he knew God called him to greater things.

He also needed to reflect and make choices. He went to commit to what his life was going to be


about. He needed time away to think and pray. In the end, he chose to stand for God's compassion and justice, even though that got his cousin, John the Baptist, arrested.

We need Lent. We need quiet time to realise that our lives can make a difference. We need time to face those *temptations*, that draw us away from God and others, to heal the world. We can ask God daily for strength because we are tempted daily to sin in ways that hurt others and hold us back from being everything we can be. Will I be a person who forgives or one who gets even? Will I spend my life seeking power and wealth or in serving others? Will I take risks in order to do the right thing?

School starts at 8.45am Monday to Friday. It is important to be on time.

It is very important for children to develop habits of arriving on time at an early age, beginning from the time they start school. Arriving on time for School and Class: Makes sure that your child doesn't miss out on the important learning activities that happen early in the day when they are most alert. Being frequently late for school or leaving early adds up to lost learning. Medical appointments should be made out of school hours if at all possible.

Mobile Phones at School

Should a student bring their mobile phone to school, they do so at their own risk and must adhere to the school rules about its use. St Joseph's will not be responsible for lost, stolen or damanged phones.

- 1. All mobile phones must be given to the classroom teacher at the beginning of the day.
- 2. All mobile phones will be handed back to the students at the end of the school day.





Absent from School:

If your child is absent from school, please ensure you notify the office (via email, flexibuzz or phone message). The roll is marked each morning at 9.30am and our schools policy is to call or text parents if their child/children are absent **without** notification.

Dear Parents

The school's homework policy is currently under review. The staff have spent time looking at the past document and raising questions and ideas for change. The research around homework is varied and does not give very clear results. At a primary school level there is some agreement that unless it is very specific homework, it has little effect. The research around reading on a daily basis is very clear. Those students, who read more on consistent basis perform better on standardised test, develop a broader vocabulary and have better comprehension skills than their peers who read inconsistently. Reading is simply the basis for so many skills needed in daily life. Below is a great visual about reading which we would like to include in our policy.

The current policy outlines expectations at each level

F/1/2 (JUNIORS):	READING: Daily reading with parents, older siblings or other adults. Approximately 5-10 minutes each night. Parents to sign Reading Record.
3/4 (MIDDLES):	MATHS: Maths Facts. READING: Daily reading to parents, older siblings, other family members or quietly to themselves. At least 10 – 15 minutes each night. Reading Record completed. MATHS: Maths Facts.
5/6 (SENIORS):	READING: Independent daily reading at least 20 - 30 minutes each night. MATHS: Maths Facts.

Some teachers have been allocating specific homework tasks to children such as spelling, specific maths topics such as time and using Study ladder to assist in home learning. This has catered for a child's very specific needs.
